Junior Department Rules

The junior department is for youth who want to enter exhibits at the La Habra Valley Community Fair. There are a number of organizations that want competition within their specific organization. The La Habra Valley Community Fair can do this by establishing divisions and classes for groups such as FFA, 4-H and others. The L.H.V.C.F will provide the opportunity for young people to exhibit who are not members of an organized group. Independent Junior exhibitors will compete in the appropriate class in direct competition with other 4H and FFA members.

***All livestock classes are reserved for 4-H and FFA members**

Community Youth

FFA Members: may participate in classes when they enroll in high school agriculture education courses and may show until the end of the next calendar year following graduation.

4-H Membership: enrollment is open to all youth from kindergarten through 12th grade through December 31st of the year in which they turn 19 years of age.

4-H Primary: members must be 5 years old or in Kindergarten by Dec. 31st of the program year. Primary members **cannot** enroll in large animal projects. **Approved** animal projects are dogs, rabbits, cats, poultry, cavy, pygmy goats.

Independent Junior Exhibitors: An independent junior is a youth in our community Ages 5-19 and enrolled in our local school districts or living in the City limits or county zones in 90631.

All entries must be done on-line!

General Livestock Rules

1. The La Habra Valley Community Fair Jr. Livestock Auction is restricted to FFA and 4-H club members that belong to chartered clubs in the La Habra City limits and reside in Orange or Los Angeles counties. All members must be in good standing as determined by chapter advisors and Community Leaders. Students may sell only one market animal in the auction.
2. FFA members may participate as a member until December 31 of the year following their graduation year.
3. All 4-H member exhibitors showing livestock must be enrolled in the appropriate livestock project for the animal they wish to show.
4. Under no circumstances may exhibitor enter the same species of animal in 4-H and FFA. Consult State Fair rules for further clarification.
5. No FFA or 4-H member may exhibit a market animal that has been sold as a market animal through any fair or Junior Livestock Auction regardless of change of ownership.
6. Representatives from every club and chapter having animals in the sale are expected to assist in the auction set-up and clean-up at the fair.
7. The Livestock Committee reserves the right to close classes and refuse additional entries if the facilities become full.
8. Judges and management may combine or cancel classes depending upon the number of entries per class. Dairy classes must have at least 3 entries. No more than two entries owned by one exhibitor in a class.
9. All market animals will be weighed per the schedules shown by species.
10. All market exhibitors will be released when their animals are moved to specified areas as directed. All pens and tie areas must be cleaned before departure.
11. All exhibitors are responsible for the care, feeding, watering of their animal until they are removed from the show grounds.
12. The fair management reserves the right to remove an animal or exhibitor from the show in case of illness, misconduct, or any other reason deemed appropriate.
13. No animal can be removed from the show grounds without the consent of the Livestock Supervisor of the show.
14. All exhibitors are required to keep their display presentable and clean for the visiting public.
15. Cattle will bed down in straw. Pigs, sheep and goats in shavings only. All bedding to be provided by LHVCV.
16. Any exhibitor who fails to show up for his/her class will not be allowed to compete in an alternate class.
17. All protests must be submitted in writing and signed within one hour of the conclusion of the show in question. All filings must be accompanied by a \$100 dollar filing fee. Decisions regarding the application and interpretation of the rules shall be made through consultation of the fair president, Division chair and member's leader or advisor. If the protest is valid the member forfeits the right to continue on in any shows and will be removed from the grounds. If the protest is upheld the filing fee will be returned 100%.
18. Any exhibitor, parent, or legal guardian found in violation of fair rules or who commits any unethical act will forfeit all premiums, awards and privileges and will not be allowed to participate in any further LHVCV activities.
19. All rules in this premium book will be followed. There will be no exceptions regardless of previous actions or precedents of the livestock committee.
20. California State Fair rules will be followed unless local rules are specified herein.
21. **All members exhibiting livestock will enter/ exit through the West gate between the two story building and the main campus. Livestock will be delivered through the same gate.**
22. Livestock superintendent will release animals when their pens and adjoining areas are clean.
23. **All animals must be shown clean and no products may be used on animals. This is a natural fair.**

Livestock Code of Ethics

Print Exhibitor Name Club/School Date

1. Exhibitors:

- A. You, your animal and your chapter/club are on exhibit during the entire show. You will be expected to keep your exhibit and adjacent areas clean.
- B. Stalls must be cleaned, with old bedding put into the designated areas at 7 p.m. unless directed otherwise by livestock superintendent. Keep aisles clean at all times. This is a safety and health factor as well as a feature of your exhibit.
- C. Destruction or theft of property, not cooperating with volunteers of the show or cooperating groups all add to a bad image-not that of a FFA or a 4-H member.

2. General: Due to fire hazards and the welfare of the exhibitors and others, the following rules must be followed by you as a condition for exhibiting.

- A. No smoking will be permitted by the 4-H or FFA members while showing, taking part in any official activity of the show, or while wearing any part of the 4-H or FFA uniform. Nor shall smoking be permitted in the tent or on the school property.
- B. The use of, or possession of firecrackers or bull whips will be grounds for immediate expulsion from the show.
- C. Lariats or other pieces of equipment subjecting anyone to injury, unless used specifically while controlling animals, are not allowed.
- D. Appropriate conduct is expected at all times. Obscene language and rough-housing will not be tolerated at any time.
- E. Gambling in any form is strictly forbidden.
- F. Drinking of alcoholic beverages or any other use of drugs shall not be tolerated.
- G. Students who are reported for neglect of stock will be appropriately dealt with.
- H. Appropriate dress will be required at activities participated in by FFA and 4-H members.
- I. Every participant must be out of the livestock tent before dark each night.

3. Exhibitors will be held responsible for damage to any facilities or equipment. FFA advisors and 4-H leaders shall be responsible for their conduct at all times.

I believe that my participation in the Junior Livestock Program should demonstrate my own ability, knowledge, and skill as a feeder and fitter of livestock. I will do my own work and only accept advice and support from others.

I will not use abusive or questionable techniques in the feeding, fitting and showing of my animals. I will not resort to fraudulent, illegal or deceptive practices when fitting them for show. I also will not allow my parents, my supervisor, or any other adult to employ such practices to my animal.

I will read and understand the rules of all livestock shows in which I am a participant. I ask that my parents and the supervisor of my project animals not break the rules or make exception on my behalf. I wish for my livestock project to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer-good and bad-and how to live with the outcome.

I realize that I am responsible for:

- the proper care and treatment of my animals,
- the production of wholesome food,
- and the development of sound moral character in myself and others.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship,, their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors, who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics", fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations that they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels. All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken with the burden on the owner, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be approved by a licensed veterinarian.
5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

CALIFORNIA JOINT POLICY GOVERNING PROJECTS & YOUTH ENROLLMENT

To maintain the fine statewide cooperation that now exists between Cooperative Extension, high school vocational agriculture departments, the California State Grange, and the California Department of Food and Agriculture’s Division of Fairs & Expositions it is essential that all staff members, leaders and advisors in these organizations and agencies be informed of the joint policy governing projects and enrollment of youth who participate in fairs and expositions as members of the 4-H, FFA, Grange or as independent exhibitors. We hope that all leaders, staff, teacher/advisors, fair and exposition officials, and members/exhibitors will observe these policies so that the best interests of all organizations and the member/exhibitors is served educationally.

The 4-H, FFA and Grange organizations recognize the role of the California Department of Food & Agriculture’s Division of Fairs and Expositions to establish and enforce state rules for educational and fair competition at California fairs. These organizations recommend to the Division of Fairs & Expositions that the content of this agreement be supported in the “State Rules for California Fairs” and that equitable rules for independent exhibitors be included. We recommend that the content of this agreement be used as a basis for rule development and enforcement at all endorsed fairs and expositions or other sponsored events.

None of the organizations, publicly or privately supported, have the right to determine the extent to which an individual can participate in projects whether as a member of an organization or independent provided the minimum requirements are met for supervised project work. The member and parents should determine what projects should be undertaken in each organization or independently. Neither the agricultural instructor, the 4-H leader, nor the Grange leader should discourage the member from following the choices agreed upon by the members and the parents.

It is agreed that when an individual belongs to more than one organization, or exhibits as an independent, he/she must carry a different project in each organization/independent. To further clarify this policy, when a member maintains projects in 4-H, FFA, Grange or independently, the projects may not be in the same kind of livestock or crop. For example, an FFA beef project in vocational agriculture and a sheep project in 4-H would be acceptable; but a beef breeding project in FFA and a beef market project in 4-H would not be acceptable-even if the animals were of different breeds. A member of an FFA chapter, Grange, or 4-H unit (club, group etc.) or independent exhibitor may transfer projects from one organization/independent to another only once during a calendar year.

To be able to show a project at an endorsed fair and exposition or other sponsored event, it must be owned and supervised according to the following requirements:

- Poultry.....Must be owned for not less than 30 days & be enrolled in the project for not less than 60 days
- Rabbits.....Must be owned for not less than 30 days & be enrolled in the project for not less than 60 days.
- All Feeder & Breeding Animals (Except Rabbits & Poultry).....Must be owned and supervised for not less than 60 days
- Market Sheep, Swine, Veal & Goats.....Must be owned and supervised for not less than 60 days
- Market Beef.....Must be owned and supervised for not less than 120 days

We are in agreement that members are expected to care for, prepare for show, and exhibit their own animals while at the fair or livestock show. However because of the educational nature of livestock shows it is appropriate on occasion for parents, leader or other youth eligible to exhibit at that show to provide assistance. Assistance should always be given only when the exhibitor is present & actively engaged.

We are opposed to inter-organization competition. We agree that separate classes for 4-H, FFA, Grange and independents should be maintained & strengthened. However, we recognize that in some circumstances combined classes may be appropriate. When combined classes are established, that decision should be reached with input and agreement by 4-H, FFA, Grange and independent representatives participating in the affected show.

We are in agreement that 4-H, FFA, Grange and the division of Fairs and Expositions will unite in an effort to support ethical and humane treatment of all animals exhibited at fairs and expositions. We also agree to reinforce the educational emphasis of competitive programs for animals, and maintain the standard of integrity of all participants while attending endorsed fairs and expositions or other sponsored events.

The 4-H Program Year for Orange County begins September 1 and ends August 31.

FFA National By-Laws/ Article VII. The Fiscal Year – The fiscal year of the Organization shall be September 1 through August 31 of the next succeeding calendar year.
